Ecclesiastes 3:14a “I know that whatever God does endures forever.”

I have been considering the fact that fifty years ago was 1967 and the summer of that year is remembered in certain quarters as the “Summer Of Love.” It was a period of time when the 1960s counter culture blossomed to the joy of some, the dismay of others and the astonishment of all. So if you were a teenager in 1967 or into your twentysomething years, did you follow the advice of pop singer Scott McKenzie and go to San Francisco? Or maybe you were in the armed forces and your travels were governed by the whims of your Uncle Sam. Or maybe you were in college here in Iowa or somewhere close. Or maybe you were working on the family farm. Or, maybe you were doing something else. A dear friend of mine who grew up on an Iowa farm was 15 years old in 1967. She was frustrated by the fact that she thought the Beatles were fab, but her dad allowed nothing but polka music in the house and he had a strongly negative opinion concerning rock music which he was not shy about expressing. She listened to the songs of Sgt. Pepper’s Lonely Hearts Club Band covertly with her friends. That was the Beatles album released on June 1, 1967, which became the primary pop music soundtrack of the summer. 1967 was a time during which the division between parents and children seemed to run the length of society, the divisions often inspired by the Vietnam War and the Civil Rights movement which continued to stir up passions that year and which still have an influence today.

In 1967, I felt reasonably secure with my family, all things considered. I was seven years during the summer before second grade. The most interesting thing going on in those days, if you asked me, was the space program. I freely admit that I was in love with the space program. The space program suffered a setback that year because of the Apollo 1 disaster in which three astronauts were killed when a fire broke out in the command module during a launch rehearsal on January 27.

Now, I think, was that really fifty years ago? And then I consider this, fifty years before that was 1917, which was practically another world. The world of 1917 seemed grainy black and white and silent to my seven year old self. The world of 1967 was brash, loud and tie dye as it is oft recalled these days. But it seems more connected to 2017. Maybe two World Wars and a Great Depression, among other upheavals between 1917 and 1967 have something to do with that. What do you think? Which fifty years brought greater change to society and how we think about things? 1917 to 1967? Or 1967 to 2017? That could be a long debate. There are people who were alive in 1917 who are still alive today. Does anyone know anyone one hundred years old or more? Wonder what they think on the matter?

Here is maybe where we can all agree. God was active in 1917, 1967 and is active in 2017, pouring out grace so that all sorts of people may come to believe and, with that belief, be agents for the love of God in a tumultuous, often down right bewildering world. It is the love of God which leads people of every generation into that goodness which endures forever.



The First United Methodist Church of Winterset is partnering with the Food Bank to provide a monthly food assistance program. The Food Bank delivers fresh produce, protein and non-perishables and we distribute the food. The Food Pantry will be held in the church lobby & fellowship hall on the **fourth Monday of each month from 4:30-6:30 pm. This is open to anyone so please let others know.** You do not have to be a Madison County resident. Please enter the east door of the church and sign in with your name, household size, zip code/county and self-declare your income eligibility. You do not have to bring or show any income papers. Please bring boxes to put your food in to carry home. **The next Food Pantries are Mondays, June 26 and July 24, from 4:30-6:30 pm.**



JUNE IS SEWING KIT MONTH

Sewing kits foster independence rather than dependence. Women can make clothing in their own size and in the style of their culture. Cottage industries often grow out of sewing classes where women use these kits to practice income—generating skills.



We are especially in need of the sewing scissors, buttons and sewing needles to finish some kits. See details below.

- 1 sewing scissors (fabric scissors only)
- 1 package hand sewing needles (assorted hand needles, at least 10 in original packaging; no craft needles)
- 3 yards cotton or cotton-blend fabric (one piece) (no patriotic, religious, holiday, camouflage or military –patterned fabric) (no heavy duty, corduroy, knit, etc.)
- 1 new spool matching thread (medium to large size; no travel kit thread)
- 5-8 matching, flat buttons on card (5/8 “ size or larger)



Wrap sewing notions in fabric. Seal in a gallon Ziploc bag. (Value \$28 plus \$2 shipping)

Individual items may be placed in the mission basket in the lobby also.

SCHOOL KITS provide tools for education, which changes lives. In countries where children don't have books, school supplies or classrooms, a school kit may be their only educational resource.

- 1 hand pencil sharpener (must be at least 1” long; remove from packaging)
- 1 2” or larger size eraser (no advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols)
- 1 box of 24 Crayola crayons (only 24)
- 1 blunt scissors (metal blades, rounded tip; no plastic scissors)
- 6 unsharpened pencils with erasers (no advertisements, religious, patriotic, military or camouflage symbols)
- 1 30 cm metric ruler (no metal strip on it; hard or flexible, no advertisements)
- 3 pads of paper, approx. 8½ x 11 wide ruled (210 to 250 sheets total) spiral or top-bound pads; no composition books, 150 sheets or less of loose leaf can be substituted for one pad.



All items are placed in a sturdy cloth bag, 14” wide x 16” long (finished size) with 1”x19” finished-size handles. Place all loose items on top of paper. Turn items sideways and slide into cloth bag. Fold over top of bag so loose items don't fall out. Do not put loose items in zip lock bags.

(Value \$11 plus \$2 shipping) School bags will be hanging in the church lobby ready to be filled. Empty school bags are also needed and are valued at \$3 each.



**FIRST UNITED METHODIST CHURCH ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL
MINUTES, May 21, 2017**

Call to Order Bob Rhoads opened the meeting at 6:33 p.m. and Pastor Ron led the group in prayer.

You Lost Me Video Series Pastor Ron shared information about a book/video series called *You Lost Me*, which addresses the issue of high school youth not attending church after they graduate. The Introduction portion of the video was shown. We will continue to watch the video at future Ad Council meetings.

Request to Use Church Library Jud Stover, as a representative of Genesis, requested use of the church library on Wednesdays, 9:00 – 11:00 a.m. to job coach individuals with disabilities. He said the availability of the current place they are meeting has become inconsistent. There would usually be no more than three people in the room at a time. After discussions and questions, Dick Hoadley made a motion to approve Genesis' use of the church library on Wednesday mornings, 9:00 – 11:00 a.m. Deb Williams seconded, and the motion carried. Bob Rhoads will present this to the Trustees to get their approval.

Approval of Minutes JoAnn Berry made a motion to approve the April minutes as presented in the newsletter. Doug Darnell seconded, and the motion carried.

Congregational Care Dick Hoadley reported on members who have either moved into a care facility or have gone home.

Endowment Fund Bob Kaldenberg said a scholarship was awarded to Colby Hinsch and will be presented to Colby next spring.

Finance Randy Gust said the Finance Committee is auditing the financial books. The church lot on the corner of Summit Street and 16th Avenue has sold for \$5,000. The District Superintendent and Trustees from the State will be here Monday night to go through the process of selling the lot, as we need permission from the conference. They will also review where the money goes; normally it would go to the conference in our church's name and used for repairs at our church.

There was not enough money left this month after paying all the bills, so no apportionments were paid this month.

Easter offering was \$1,770.

The Finance Committee is investigating a year-round Stewardship program. They have discussed highlighting members or long-standing members and talk more gifts and talents rather than money and giving.

SPPRC has recommended paying Bob Rhoads, Bev Bircher & Carol and Doug Darnell for filling in as janitors until Steve started.

Effective January 1, the Conference will reimburse the church for half of the difference between Pastor Ron's salary and the \$47,000 approved for a new pastor.

Kathy Fay presented the most recent balance sheet. After all bills were paid, there is approximately \$700 left in the general fund account prior to EFT deposits coming into the account.

Intentional Faith Deb Kaldenberg said that she, Nate Mason, Megan Barrett and Pastor Ron recently met to discuss educational opportunities for the junior high/middle school kids. Deb contacted Jaye Johnson at the Conference, and he shared concerns about embarking on another project until the Conflict Transformation process was completed and we know what the church's goals are. There is an all-day conference on October 3 that Deb and Pastor Ron plan to attend to learn more about what the multi-generational Discipleship Pathway program is. There will be a retreat at some point following the conference. More information will be forthcoming.

Missions Bev Bircher said that hopefully a date will be set for the ice cream social before newsletter is sent out.

Trustees Bob Rhoads reported that 13 new toilets have been purchased & installed throughout the church. The Trustees have discussed replacement of the library carpet, and they have removed the toilet and sink in the janitor's closet behind the kitchen to create a secure place to store hazardous materials. They will need to work on the plumbing for the dishwasher drain.

Worship Dick Hoadley said that at some point 5th and 6th graders will be trained as acolytes, but for now, the head ushers will light the candles before worship services. They are checking into serving gluten-free Communion wafers. Pastor Ron provided notebooks about Communion for the Worship Committee members to read.

Pastor Ron's Report Bob LaFollette passed away last week. Bob Kaldenberg said the church will be given the costumes that had been used at the live nativities.

Pastor Ron will be on vacation the week after Memorial Day; Nancy Ruby will preach on June 4, and Jud Stover will officiate Communion.

Pastor Ron will be attending Annual Conference the next weekend; Bob Rhoads will preach on June 11.

Request for Use of Church Genesis Discovery program has also requested use of the church for a larger group every week, Wednesday through Friday, 8:30 a.m. – 2:30 p.m. for up to 20 people and staff. Medicaid requires that they meet off site from the Genesis property. They would not be here all of the time but would need the space available in case they need it for the large group.

There was concern that a long-term, large group such as this would require extra janitor/cleaning time and could conflict with other groups already using the church. Also, volunteers may not be available for this type of a large time-commitment.

After much discussion, it was decided that even though our church has a reputation for being mission-minded, the congregation is comfortable with its current level of community engagement. Bev Bircher made a motion to deny Genesis’s request to use the church for the large group. Dick Hoadley seconded, and the motion carried.

Food Pantry The mobile Food Pantry is May 22.

Next Meeting June 25, 2017 at 6:30 p.m.

Adjournment The meeting was adjourned at 8:07 p.m., and the meeting was closed with a prayer.




The Teens 4 Christ Choir surprised Meredith and named Meredith and Bill Easter as their "Unsung Heroes."




